In parallel with the holding of the special exhibition "I wanna hold you! Modern Japanese Wood Sculpture: 19th century-" (Nov. 29 to Jan. 15), we are pleased to present the exhibition, "The World of Katuzo Entsuba, the Sculptor" (to April 15; exhibits may be partly changed).

Kakuzo Entsuba was born in Mutsugi-cho, Hiroshima Prefecture (the present-day Onomichi City). After doing his apprenticeship under Hidemitsu Ishiwari, he went up to Tokyo to study at Japan Fine Arts School in 1928. His *Seiyo* was accepted at the 11th Teiten Exhibition in 1930 for the first time. After graduation, he studied under Seiko Sawada. In 1965, his *Ryojo* was awarded the Minister Prize of Education at the Nitten Exhibition, followed by the Japan Art Academy Prize for the same piece the next year. In 1988, he was presented with the Order of Culture, and made Prestigious People of

Hiroshima Prefecture the next year. In 1993, Entsuba Katsuzo Sculptural Art Museum opened in Mutsugi-cho, Onomichi City. He also worked a number of public sculptures including those at Tokyo Station, Hiroshima Station, and Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park, and so on.

In this exhibition, you will be introduced to a variety of work of arts of Entsuba who dared to challenge various materials such as bronze, terracotta and so on, although he himself focused the creation on wood sculptures. Please visit along with the special exhibition. We hope you to appreciate the great individuality of the world of Katsuzo Entsuba.
